from Understanding Sense of Belonging:

Creating a sense of belonging takes time and effort on students' parts

First 6 weeks are important to get engaged

Worries about fitting in are common (for both students and families!)



from But Nobody Told Me... What You Need to Know & Where to Find It:

The Office of Academic Advising (OAA) offers walk-in hours every Monday-Friday from 12-4

The Academic Services Calendar on the Registrar's website has all key dates

Encourage your student to seek help in advance of important deadlines; exceptions to academic rules should not be expected



from From College to Career:

Students from a variety of majors land interesting internships and jobs: "You are not married to your major"

OPCD supports ALL students, whether they don't know what they want or they have it all figured out

Students should engage with the OPCD office/events often



from Living in the Forest:

We have a 6 semester residency requirement because living on campus is an important part of the Wake experience

The goal for roommates should be peaceful coexistence; friendship on top of that is a bonus (not an expectation)

If roommate conflicts, students must work through the mediation process



from Staying Safe at Wake:

If students have an issue, call University Police/911/use the Wake Safe app to report it (posting on social media or calling families doesn't alert police!)

University Police is our on-campus police; off campus is the jurisdiction of the Winston-Salem Police. We work together.

Campus safety is everyone's shared responsibility



from Foundations of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion:

Our model for Inclusive Excellence is RIDE (Realizing Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity)

We seek awareness and empathy for ensuring that all Wake Foresters have access to all that Wake Forest has to offer
