

Cross-Cultural Engagement & Reentry

CGS 152 is designed to facilitate your reentry from a study away experience, identify and deepen intercultural learning gained through study abroad and apply that learning going forward. Thus, you will focus on the matrix of reentry transition, learning outcomes and expansion of the study away experience.

Goals of CGS 152

- Reflect upon and process reentry transition
- Identify and articulate learning of abroad culture and home culture
- Identify and articulate development of identity through the abroad experience
- Foster curiosity and action plans for continued intercultural learning
- Foster the ability to analyze cultural influences in a given context
- Identify and communicate transferable skills from an abroad experience to work and life at home

Honor Code

All students are expected to abide by the honor code and other guiding principles of the Wake Forest community. This means not cheating, plagiarizing (using someone else's work as your own), or other academic misconduct. For this or any other class, if you have any questions about what cheating or plagiarism means, please ask me. I want you to know, so that you can avoid problems and have success with your own, honest, work.

Course Basics

This course is asynchronous which allows you to complete the readings and assignments for each module at your convenience. Each module spans a week, with all submissions **typically due by the following Monday at 11:59pm**. I do not count off for late assignments nor will I chase after a missing assignment – that is your responsibility. You are allowed to miss two (2) general assignments, but *not* from the same Module; missing more than two – or two from the same Module – will result in an automatic Fail for the course. The final project is mandatory. There is no textbook. Readings and assignments are accessible on the Canvas site.

Course Pre-Requisite

To enroll in CGS 152 you must have participated in a WFU or WFU-affiliate study away program during a previous term.

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Course Requirements and Expectations

This course is graded on a P/F basis. To pass you must earn 70/100 on your final paper and complete the following:

- This syllabus is dense. Read the instructions carefully, plan ahead and let the instructor know if you have any questions.
- Log onto Canvas, do the readings, watch the videos and complete the assignments.
- In addition to giving thoughtful responses to the assignments, I ask that you:
 - Copy/paste the questions you are answering into your response
 - Proofread your responses before submitting
 - Answer all questions assigned; if something is missing, you will need to resubmit to get credit
- Assignments should be thoughtful and complete. You will receive credit
 for each assignment based on two standards: The *quality* of the content
 (the assignment is completed thoroughly and thoughtfully) and
 proofreading (standard English usage/punctuation, spelling, grammar,
 etc.). You will be asked to edit or redo assignments that are
 incomplete or insufficient.
- You are allowed to miss two (2) general assignments, but not from the same Module; missing more than two will result in an automatic Fail for the course. The final assignment is mandatory.
- All assignments will be submitted through Canvas.
- Unless otherwise stated, submissions should be double-spaced using 12pt font.
- Some assignments in Canvas will be uploaded in a Discussion Forum
 format where you will be able to view the submissions of your Wake
 Forest classmates who participated in various study abroad programs.
 Although it is not required, I encourage you to read the various
 submissions and comment or ask questions if you feel compelled. This
 is designed to give you an opportunity to see how your experience
 compares with others and expand the perspective you have.

Final Project: 70% or above to pass

You will have the choice of two options: a Reflective essay or a Photo Essay. Details are provided in Canvas.
