Dr. Andrew Gurstelle, *Associate Teaching Professor, Department of Anthropology*

The Department of Anthropology Outstanding Senior Award..... Zhanyi Qi

The faculty of the Department of Anthropology select our outstanding senior award using three criteria: the student's academic excellence across all four subfields of anthropology, the student's anthropological engagement outside of the traditional classroom, and the student's ethical application of anthropological knowledge through professional activities and community involvement. Zhanyi Qi is a model scholar whose study of human culture speaks to the totality of anthropological research. His insights and contributions have enlivened anthropology classrooms, and his extracurricular research in Nepal observed the intersections of art, religion, and economy. The melding of these efforts is a public exhibit that he curated about his research at the Lam Museum on campus. Zhanyi will pursue graduate studies in the United States in the fall.



Dr. Nikki Moore, Assistant Professor of Art History, Department of Art

The Inaugural Excellence in Art History Award Caroline Mederos

This award honors a graduating senior who embodies the core values of the Department of Art: respect, empathy, curiosity, and fairness. From intro classes to her art history honors thesis, Caroline Mederos has shown what becomes possible when close visual analysis, cultural and political history, and a commitment to social justice converge — an art history practiced, truly, in the spirit of pro humanitate. Her honors thesis on Wifredo Lam moves boldly beyond the existing literature, arguing that Lam transcends the decolonization of Cubism and Surrealism to bear witness to the strength and resistance of his own Afro-Cuban and Sino-Cuban communities.

David Faber, Professor of Studio Art - Printmaking, Department of Art

The Inaugural Excellence in Studio Art Award Makenzie Marie Lawson

This award honors a graduating studio art senior who exemplifies what it means to be an artist and an active citizen – embodying the core values of the Department of Art: respect, empathy, curiosity, and fairness. Makenzie Lawson's creative endeavors and her imaginative energies are palpable; her dedication to the making of images comes with purpose and she executes her imaginative concepts with great sureness and care. She never wavers, even while encountering the recalcitrance of any medium. Her images are recondite and she moves steadily forward into new venues with aplomb.

Dr. Gloria Muday, Charles M. Allen Professor of Biology, Director, Biochemistry and Molecular Biology Program

The Biochemistry and Molecular Biology Research Award Sophia Kothari and Nathan Philip

The Award for Outstanding Researcher in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology is presented to two graduating BMB majors in recognition of their excellence in research and scholarship.

Sophie Kothari completed her honor's research in the laboratory of Dr. Katherine Albanese as the first member of this research group. Sophie developed and led all aspects of a new research project focused on engineering multi-domain fusion histone reader proteins. Sophie is both an independent researcher and a supportive member of her research group who encourages her peers with a warmth that elevates the whole lab environment. Sophie has presented her work at two research conferences, receiving awards for her outstanding presentations. Sophie will be working as a healthcare consultant before enrolling in a Ph.D program.

Nate Philip has been engaged in epigenetic research for 3.5 years in the laboratory of Dr. Ke Zhang Reid. He studied the interaction of yeast proteins that controls their movement into stress granules. Nate's mentor notes that he is not satisfied with superficial understanding and is persistent in mastering every aspect of his project. Nate has a unique combination of strong technical and writing skills that lead to an excellent honor's thesis. Nate will work in healthcare investment banking after graduation.

Dr. Katy Lack, Teaching Professor, Department of Biology

The Carolina Biological Supply Company Award for Undergraduate Research Christopher Lawrence

The Carolina Biological Supply Company Research Award is awarded to a Wake Forest senior biology major who has performed an outstanding research project. This year's winner is Christopher Lawrence, who majored in biology with a minor in chemistry. Christopher was mentored by Dr. Michael Rizzo, and his project uses bioinformatic modeling to investigate genes and cell types that may be involved in mood disorders such as major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder, and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. This year, Christopher published a first-author manuscript in PLoS One in which he demonstrated the strength of multivariate genome-wide association study approaches to identify candidate genes involved in multiple psychiatric disorders.

Dr. Greg Pool, Anderson Professor, Center for Entrepreneurship

The Center for Entrepreneurship Senior of the Year Award Sophia Mayer Baltzan

The Center for Entrepreneurship Senior Award is given to a Wake Forest senior graduating with a minor in entrepreneurship, selected based on overall performance in entrepreneurship courses, engagement in entrepreneurship co-curricular programs, and overall involvement in activities designed to enrich the culture of entrepreneurship at Wake Forest. Sophie Baltzan has been an exceptional entrepreneurship student since her first year at Wake Forest excelling both academically and professionally. She was selected to be in both Deacon Springboard and Startup Lab, and represented Wake Forest at the ACC Inventure Prize. She gives back to our center and students through mentoring, being a TA in multiple classes, and is always available to assist her peers with their ventures; she embodies the Pro Humanitate spirit that our students aspire to. The Center for Entrepreneurship is so pleased to present Sophie with this award.



Dr. John Lukesh, Associate Professor, Department of Chemistry

The John W. Nowell Award in Undergraduate Chemistry Katrina Hu

The John W. Nowell Award in Undergraduate Chemistry is given in memory of the late beloved chemistry Professor, Jack Nowell, and is presented each year to a graduating major who has excelled in all aspects of our chemistry program (ranging to outstanding performance in the classroom to independent research in the laboratory). This year's recipient is Katrina Hu. Katrina is an exceptional student and has distinguished herself as the most self-directed and high-performing undergraduate student that I have supervised. In just over two years, her research accomplishments have reached a level comparable to advanced graduate students in my group. I anticipate that her work will lead to several peer-reviewed publications including one as first author, a milestone no prior undergraduate in my lab has come close to attaining. Katrina will be attending Harvard Medical School this fall.

Dr. Michael Sloan, Chair, Department of Classics

M. D. Phillips Prize in Classical Languages..... Zoe Hirshfeld

Matthew D. Phillips earned a degree in Greek in 1875, the same year his brother John earned a degree in mathematics. One hundred years later, in 1975, William R. Phillips (WFU class of 1960) established a fund to honor his grandfather and great uncle and to congratulate the outstanding graduating senior in Greek or Latin in Classics and in mathematics for excellent work. This year's recipient of the M. D. Phillips Prize in Classical Languages is Zoe Hirshfeld.

Zoe Hirshfeld took seriously WFU's mission: her investment and engagement in the department of classics over the last four years proved her genuine interest in learning for the sake of refinement. Zoe, you are intellectually curious, disciplined, and of an agile mind; those very characteristics that served you well in our courses, will assuredly launch you into a flourishing future. The department will miss your joyful and kind presence as we root for your every success.

The Jeremy Nottingham Pro Humanitate Award..... Theo Berson

The Jeremy Nottingham Pro Humanitate Department of Communication Award is named after the late Jeremy Nottingham, who exemplified the spirit of Pro Humanitate with his commitment to giving and serving his communities. The Nottingham Award recognizes involvement in community engaged service within and beyond Wake Forest.

Theo Berson is impressive for his professionalism and his willingness to serve. As Executive Director of Hit the Bricks, he helped lead the organization to raise the highest amount of funds in the event's history. Theo is also an incredible ambassador for both the Department of Communication and the broader Wake Forest community outside of HTB. He consistently steps up when asked to help, especially in ways that support other students and campus groups. For example, he agreed to serve as the emcee for TEDxWakeForestU, even though he isn't a member of the organizing club. Theo still manages to be humble. Theo is out there demonstrating and doing. He gives credit to those around him without claiming any for himself. He has been heavily involved in AK Psi and as an admissions ambassador - which in itself shows he cares about our community.

Dr. William Turkett, Chair, Department of Computer Science

The John W. Sawyer Prize in Computer Science..... Yimin Wang and Jason Zipeng Zhang

Established in 1993 in honor of Dr. Jack Sawyer, professor of Mathematics from 1956 to 1988 and the first computer science instructor at Wake Forest, the Sawyer Prize is awarded each year to the most outstanding graduating senior in computer science as selected by the faculty. This is a significant honor and testament to the student's hard work and commitment to their education and to the Computer Science Department.

Yimin Wang is recognized for his excellence in coursework and rich contributions to research, including co-authoring of multiple research manuscripts, presentation of research at an international bioinformatics conference, and receipt of an honorable mention award in the National Computing Research Association Outstanding Undergraduate Researcher competition.

Jason Zhang is recognized for his excellence in coursework; significant contributions to department culture, including as president of the Computer Science student club, through working as a teaching assistant for computer science courses; and rich contributions to research, including co-authoring multiple research manuscripts and presentation of research at the international AAAI conference.

Outstanding Japanese Major of the Year Avelina Axonov

*The Outstanding Japanese Major of the Year is awarded to the graduating senior in Japanese Language and Culture who has achieved academic success in our major curriculum, which includes both language learning and cultural studies courses, and has also demonstrated engagement with Japanese outside the classroom. Avelina Axonov has demonstrated her commitment to Japanese language and culture through her perfect GPA in the major; her two study abroad terms in Japan, and her enthusiastic participation in Japanese-language student conferences and speech contests. She has also helped foster a community of Japanese learners through her service in the incredibly active and awesome Japanese Studies Club. Avelina's Honors thesis project analyzes the popular anime *The Apothecary Diaries* as more than just a story of a young servant girl who solves mysteries and unravels conspiracies, but also as a critical reevaluation and rewriting of women's place in traditional East Asian society. The thesis, like Avelina herself, is imaginative, rigorous, and brilliant. The Department of East Asian Languages and Cultures congratulates Avelina on this achievement!*

The recipient of the award this year is Gabe Feurtado, recognized for his dedication to rational, multidimensional inquiries into the East Asian Region, the intellectual rigor and originality of his coursework, and his active engagement in academic events related to East Asian studies at Wake Forest.

David and Lelia Farr Prize for Excellence in Economics Sophie Gunn

The David and Lelia Farr Prize for Excellence in Economics is presented to a student who has demonstrated outstanding academic achievement in economics.

Sophie Gunn has distinguished herself as one of the top economics majors in her class, combining exceptional academic performance with strong engagement in the department. She has served as a teaching assistant, participated actively in Women in Economics, and maintained one of the highest GPAs in the major. She also brought strong interdisciplinary skills to her honors thesis on commodity price shocks and fiscal capacity in rural Colombia, drawing on her Spanish major to work with multiple data sources. The project earned high honors and reflects the intellectual rigor and independence she demonstrated throughout her time at Wake Forest University.

David and Lelia Farr Prize for Excellence in Mathematical Economics Sasha Skinner

The David and Lelia Farr Prize for Excellence in Mathematical Economics is presented to a mathematical economics student who has performed exceptionally well academically.

Sasha is an outstanding student and has also been deeply involved in the department. In addition to achievements in the classroom, Sasha served as a research assistant for multiple faculty members on projects spanning environmental economics to sports economics. She also completed a URECA summer research project examining the environmental effects of acid rain reduction programs. In her senior year, Sasha earned high honors for an honors thesis on the effect of legalized online sports betting on alcohol-related traffic fatalities.

The Linda B. and Howard S. Stern Family Foundation Award for

Outstanding Seniors in Elementary Education Sydney Elizabeth Branch and Margaret Katarina Ripsteen

The Linda B. and Howard S. Stern Family Foundation Award for Outstanding Seniors in Education honors graduating seniors who identify as education majors and minors and who best demonstrate and/or reflect the core components of the Department of Education's conceptual framework: knowledge, purpose, engagement, experience, and leadership.

Sydney Branch is an award recipient for elementary education from Silver Spring, Maryland. Sydney majored in elementary education (licensure pathway) and minored in entrepreneurship. She served on the Department of Education's Student Leadership Council, student taught at Jefferson Elementary School, and interned as a winter financial analyst in the DC Navy Yard. After graduation, Sydney plans to complete a residency at Two Cities Church Residency in middle school ministry development and a Master's in Christian Ministry from Southeastern Seminary.

Margaret Ripsteen is an award recipient for elementary education from Berkeley, California. Margaret double majored in elementary education (non-licensure pathway) and Spanish. She has served on the Department of Education's Student Leadership Council and volunteered weekly for the past three years in kindergarten classrooms at Mineral Springs Elementary School. After graduation, Margaret will attend Harvard University for a Masters in Elementary Education before pursuing a position as an elementary school teacher.

The Whole Engineer AwardTate Piercy

This award recognizes an engineering student that has demonstrated academic excellence, outstanding character, and embodies the values of the Engineering Department: empowerment, growth, integrity, inclusion, compassion, and joy.

Tate majored in engineering with a concentration in mechanical engineering and minored in physics. She performed research in my lab investigating methods to coat medical angioplasty balloons with sirolimus and studied abroad in London. Tate is widely recognized by her peers and faculty for her positive energy in the classroom and as a teaching assistant. She is kind and respectful to peers, instructors, and mentors, and is quick to volunteer and empowers everyone with whom she interacts. Tate will be pursuing a masters degree in aerospace engineering at the University of Florida next year.

H. Broadus Jones Senior Award for Excellence in English Anne Jones

The H. Broadus Jones Excellence Award is given each year to a graduating senior whose work exemplifies the spirit of scholarship and dedication to the study of literature that Professor Jones modeled during his long tenure at Wake Forest.

Anne Jones is the winner of the English Department’s H. Broadus Jones Senior Excellence Award, and she is also our winner of the H. Broadus Jones Shakespeare prize, awarded to a student whose oral and written work shows the greatest insight into Shakespeare. Passionate about literature and intellectually ambitious, Anne is always trying to understand and wrestle with big ideas and their stakes. Her honors thesis sits at the cutting edge of thinking on aesthetics and race, with crystal clear prose even as it delves further and further into challenging sophisticated terrain. She is the unanimous choice of the English department faculty to be recognized as our most outstanding senior major.

Environmental Science Award Ardyn Smith

The Environmental Science Award is given to a Wake Forest senior graduating with a major in environmental science, selected on the basis of overall performance in ENV courses, engagement in original research, and a commitment to building a more sustainable future. While earning a double major in environmental science and statistics and a minor in economics, Ardyn has served in a variety of internship roles, including those that provided her with opportunities to improve energy efficiency and waste management in the industrial sector, aid in indoor air quality research, and participate in various field data collection efforts related to ecological monitoring and restoration. Ardyn culminated her Wake Forest studies with an honors thesis exploring the connection between socioenvironmental factors and the spread of valley fever and will begin a dual-degree graduate program at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in the fall.

Environment and Sustainability Studies Award Abigail Rise

The Environment and Sustainability Studies Award is given to a Wake Forest graduating senior with a major in environment and sustainability studies, selected on the basis of overall performance in ENV courses, accomplishment of original research, and a commitment to action. Abigail is double major in environment & sustainability studies and French studies. She has consistently demonstrated excellence in complex coursework ranging from climate change to water resources. Beyond her studies, she has translated theory into action as a Connect & Cultivate Leader at the campus garden and as the Greeks Go Green representative. Her leadership as the Ecology Area Director at Camp Sinoquipe earned her “Area Director of the Year” honors for overseeing vital conservation projects and student education. Abigail’s legacy of advocacy, underscored by her \$2,500 New Jersey Student Climate Challenge grant, exemplifies the spirit of sustainable leadership.

The Harold Dawes Parcell Award for Excellence in French Graesyn Heimer, Charlie Kost, and Abby Rise

Established to honor the memory of a longtime colleague and department chair, the Harold Dawes Parcell Award is given to the graduating French Studies major who has the highest grade point average and a record of exceptional scholarship. This year, the French Studies Department chose to recognize three outstanding students.

Graesyn Heimer, a French studies and biology major, brings an exceptional combination of intellectual rigor and elegance to everything she does in French studies. In her study of literature, she approaches texts with openness and care, from a position of compassion and ethical consideration, without ever settling for easy interpretations. Her spoken and written French is stellar, and her analytical voice is one that her professors and peers will not soon forget. The French Studies Department is confident that her intellectual curiosity and work ethics will serve her well in her future endeavors, and we are proud to celebrate her as one of our finest students.

Charlie Kost is a French studies major with a concentration in French for business, as well as a major in politics and international affairs. Charlie is an exceptional student, and an exceptional person. During our study abroad in Dijon, he was deeply curious, open to each new experience and person he encountered. He was also incredibly easy going - a wonderful, steady presence in the group. This year, Charlie successfully completed an honors thesis in French, in which he compared the discourse of two courts (court of cassation and court of appeal) under the French Fifth Republic –a significant undertaking which bridged his two majors. Charlie presented his research at the Undergraduate Conference on Languages and Cultures at Elon University. Next year, Charlie will begin graduate studies at UCL (University College London) where he'll pursue a Master's in Applied Linguistics.

Abby Rise, one of the most dedicated and gifted students in our department, is one of our three recipients this year. A double major in French Studies and Environment and Sustainability Studies, she completed an Honors thesis in which she analyzed the conception of time in the short texts of the contemporary French writer Philippe Delerm. Her close readings of these complex writings are graceful and astute, and one of her conclusions – that Delerm finds solace in the embodied sensations of everyday experiences – is certainly fitting of our contemporary moment. It has been a privilege to watch her grow as a scholar and as a member of our community. We wish her every success as she moves forward.

The Paul M. Ribisl Health and Exercise Science Academic Achievement Award Henry Humphries

The Paul Ribisl Health and Exercise Science Academic Achievement Award was established to honor the graduating HES student with the highest cumulative GPA. It is our honor to present this award to Henry Humphries who is graduating with his BS in HES and a minor in history, achieving a perfect 4.0 GPA. He was selected for the highly competitive HES Honors Program, where his research examined the effects of local muscle cooling on neuromuscular function. In addition to his academic and research excellence, Henry contributes meaningfully to the department as a teaching assistant for the Advanced Anatomy Lab, where he supports student learning during weekly cadaver dissections. Henry has also been engaged in service to the community, volunteering with Campus Kitchen, and supporting patient care for underserved and uninsured populations through his work at the Community Care Clinic. Upon graduation, Henry will begin a position as a clinical research technician in the Department of Anesthesiology at Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist, with plans to pursue a career in medicine.

The William L. Hottinger Health and Exercise Science Major Contribution Award Christopher Dietrich

The William Hottinger Health and Exercise Science Major Contribution Award was established to honor the graduating major who not only excels in their academic achievements, but also, for their contributions to the major and larger campus. Christopher Dietrich exemplifies what it means to excel both in the classroom and in the community. His dedication to public health is evident through his extensive volunteer work with the WF AmeriCorps program, the Community Care Center, and the Comprehensive Cancer Center, earning the admiration of everyone fortunate enough to work alongside him. Upon graduation, Chris will begin a position as a clinical research technician in the Department of Anesthesiology at Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist, with plans to pursue a career in medicine.

Dr. Megan Bennett-Jones, Director, Health Policy and Administration Program

The Michael S. Lawlor Award for Outstanding Student in the Health Policy and Administration Program Emma Thalgott

The award for outstanding student in Health Policy and Administration is named in honor of Dr. Michael Lawlor, a visionary who created this interdisciplinary minor encompassing public health, economics, and epidemiology, and is presented to the graduating student excelling in both academics and service.

Today we honor Emma Thalgott, whose intellectual curiosity, depth of character, and genuine care for others exemplifies the HPA spirit. Emma is a certified Advanced Emergency Medical Technician and Advanced Cardiac Life Support provider, first responder, Trauma-Informed Certified Labor Doula opening her own practice to support underserved women, and Spanish medical interpreter volunteering with patients experiencing poverty. Through her HPA internship with "City with Dwellings", Emma served as a resource navigator and group leader for the unhoused, and completed an honors thesis developing a framework to normalize medication data for clinical analysis. Dr. Rais Rahman, Chair, Department of History

The Forrest W. Clonts Award for Excellence in History Thais Perez

Thais Perez exemplifies excellence in the study of history, distinguished by her commitment to rigorous research and scholarly achievement. She has earned numerous honors, including Wake Forest's Richter and URECA fellowships and participation in the Dumbarton Oaks Plant Humanities Summer Program, a Harvard-affiliated fellowship designed for graduate-level students. Her honors thesis, which examines representations of coca in botanical texts of the early Spanish empire, received the history department's paper prize.

Perez has actively shared her research at Wake Forest's student conferences and expanded her experience through an internship at the Montgomery Botanical Center in Florida, where she contributed to archival organization while advancing her own work. Her writing will appear in Dumbarton Oaks' Plant Humanities Lab website, and an article is forthcoming in Cornell University's student history journal. In recognition of these accomplishments, she has been awarded the 2026 Forrest W. Clonts Award for Excellence in History.



Dr. Víctor Hernández-Huerta, Director, Latin American and Latino Studies Program

The Award for Outstanding Senior in Latin American and Latino StudiesThais Perez

The Outstanding Senior Award for Excellence in Latin American and Latino Studies recognizes the graduating minor whose work in and outside the classroom is most meritorious.

Thais Perez exemplifies the highest standards of scholarship in Latin American and Latino Studies, with an extraordinary undergraduate research record that includes multiple forthcoming publications and archival projects at institutions such as Dumbarton Oaks and the Montgomery Botanical Center. Her thesis on how knowledge about coca moved between Indigenous communities and European scientists is especially original, showing how Spanish naturalists reshaped that knowledge in ways that reduced its cultural significance. She has consistently expanded her expertise through competitive fellowships, international research, and collaborations with faculty mentors. Faculty describe her as a dedicated, intellectually mature student whose research bridges science, intellectual history, and Latin American history in pathbreaking ways. Her acceptance into Tulane's Ph.D. program in Latin American history only reinforces how much promise she has as a future scholar.

Dr. Miaohua Jiang, Professor, Department of Mathematics

The John Y. Phillips Prize in MathematicsTianhao Xie

The John Y. Phillips Prize was established in 1975 by William R. Phillips and other descendants of Dr. M.D. Phillips of Stokes County. John Y. Phillips, brother of M.D. Phillips was a member of the Wake Forest College class of 1875. A superior student of mathematics who later studied at Richmond Hill Law School in Yadkin County, John Y. Phillips practiced law in Stokes County and also served in the North Carolina General Assembly. The John Y. Phillips Prize is awarded each year to one or two outstanding seniors in the Department of Mathematics. For 2025-2026, the Phillips Prize is being awarded to Tianhao "Jack" Xie.

Jack is a student with endless mathematical curiosity and talent. He completed multiple research projects in widely different mathematical areas, including a published paper in combinatorics, as well as an impressive senior thesis in applied math. Throughout his time at Wake, Jack asked fascinating questions of his professors that demonstrated a deep understanding of the curriculum and an ability to synthesize material. He spent a semester studying math in Budapest and will start a Ph.D. program at Rice University this fall.

Dr. Charles Wilkins, Co-Director, Middle East and South Asia Studies Program

The Darlene R. May Award for Outstanding Senior in ArabicKatherine Claybrook

This award is named after Darlene R. May, who established the Arabic program at Wake Forest in 2005 and taught with distinction until her retirement in 2021.

This year, MESAS is pleased to honor Katherine Claybrook for her outstanding achievement, dedication, and contributions to the Arabic program. In her completion of both the MESAS and Arabic minors, Katherine impressively completed eight Arabic language courses, two independent studies in the Arabic language, and a course on Arab literature in translation. Moreover, in her role as the MESAS Assistant Editor, Katherine helped write and produce the MESAS newsletter and manage publicity and social media for the MESAS program. The Arabic program is pleased to present Katherine with this award.

The B. G. Gokhale Award for Outstanding Senior in Hindi-Urdu Fahad Janjua

This award is named after Professor Balkrishna Govid Gokhale, who established the Asian Studies Program at Wake Forest in 1960 and remained a leader in South Asian Studies until his retirement in 1990.

This year, MESAS is pleased to honor Fahad Janjua for his outstanding achievement in Hindi-Urdu and for his contributions to campus life related to South Asia. Fahad completed four courses focusing on Urdu language and literature and has achieved outstanding proficiency in the language. In his roles as both president and treasurer of the Muslim Student Association, Fahad has helped to create meaningful opportunities for cultural exchange and interfaith dialog on campus. The Hindi-Urdu program is pleased to present Fahad with this award.

Florence Robinson Outstanding Neuroscience Student AwardYiwei Tang

The Florence Robinson Neuroscience Award is given to a Wake Forest senior graduating with a minor in Neuroscience and is selected based on performance in NEU courses, engagement in research, and communication of research results.

Yiwei is a psychology major who has conducted research in the labs of Dr. Wayne Pratt, Dr. Anthony Sali, and Dr. Joost Maier. In Dr. Pratt's lab, Yiwei did her psychology honors thesis work studying the neuropharmacology of food-motivated behaviors. She presented her work in two meetings and contributed to a manuscript. In Dr. Sali's lab, she designed and carried out her own study on human emotion and attention, including programming tasks and analyzing EEG data. In Dr. Maier's lab, she used optogenetics and neural recordings in rats to study how brain circuits process sensory information. Yiwei has been accepted into a Ph.D. program in neuroscience at Emory University, where she will investigate the neural circuits underlying decision making, motivation, and adaptive behaviors.

Beyond the classroom and lab, Alyssa founded and grew Wake Forest's NAMI chapter to over 300 members, and developed a neuroscience-based mental health curriculum now used across North Carolina middle schools. In all of her work, Alyssa has demonstrated the generosity of spirit and collaborative leadership that Bob Beck himself embodied. Faculty mentors describe her as reliable beyond measure, and someone whose warmth and intellectual engagement elevate every community she joins.

Every fall semester, Wake Forest faculty nominate graduating seniors as orators; these are students, who, the faculty believe, have something significant to say about their time at Wake Forest. This is in keeping with a tradition of senior speeches that dates back to the founding of the College in 1834 and was in fact required of all Wake Forest seniors up until the early 1880s. Following faculty nominations, 40 students took the opportunity to reflect on their experience at Wake Forest and submit an oration. We convened a panel of faculty to read these reflections and select 10 students who presented orations at our senior colloquium. A panel of faculty selected a short list of 3 orators and the top orator for 2026, who then read the oration at the Founders' Day convocation. Our top orator for 2026 is Chase Clark with her oration, "I've Seen Why the Caged Bird Sings". Chase is from Colfax, NC and is majoring in North African Studies and Communication.

The William C. and Ruth N. Archie Award Isabella Romine and Matthew Bourguignon:

Isabella has been an asset to the Wake Forest Russian program since she joined it, contributing to our classes and raising the program profile both on campus and abroad. Isabella has used the opportunities afforded to her by Wake Forest to gain a true liberal arts education, taking—and mastering—a wide variety of subjects, and becoming a genuine world traveler, experiencing the riches of human cultures both through theoretical study here on the Reynolda Campus, and through practical, hands-on immersion around the world.

Along with her academic activities, Isabella has held several internships in government service, using her Russian skills and her journalism training to monitor Russian-language media sources and provide support to journalists across the former USSR who had been unjustly detained. Isabella also spent time in Moldova with the National Security Language Initiative for Youth. Throughout her undergraduate career, Isabella has been guided by the questions that emerged from her time in Moldova: How can we speak to one another across linguistic, cultural, and political divides?

I cannot think of a student better suited to represent the Wake Russian program, the ideals of pro humanitate, and Wake Forest University overall. I am confident that Isabella will make Wake Forest proud of her future accomplishments wherever she might be in the world!

Matt has been one of the most genuinely engaged students I have taught in my thirty years at Wake Forest, and I believe he exemplifies the commitment to liberal learning, scholarship, and the ideals of Wake Forest that this award is meant to honor.

Matt was a student in my class. The kind of intellectual engagement he brought to that course is rare. He came to each meeting with questions that were noticeably more sophisticated than what I usually encounter — questions that pushed past the surface of the readings and into the assumptions underneath them. His curiosity was genuine, his thinking was independent, and he treated ideas as things that mattered. That, I believe, is what liberal learning is about.

Matt lives pro humanitate in ways that extend beyond the classroom and the lab. On his own time, he has been building a comprehensive mental health care services directory for foster parents in Winston-Salem and surrounding counties. He has carried his research skills directly into this project: locating key information efficiently, double-checking its veracity, and organizing it to maximize accessibility and use. The result is a database of more than 100 services that will help foster families more easily access support when they need it. He has done this work, as he does everything else, without fanfare or ego.
