Significant Differences Across Specific Responses WFU '18 Men vs Women

Assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 male respondents to any one particular survey item (n=84) along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 male respondents is 10.7%.

Similarly, assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 female respondents to any one particular survey item (n=109), along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 female respondents is 9.4%.

However, items identified here relied upon each item's actual number of responses and proportions when testing whether the differences in proportions between the groups, at the 95% confidence interval, included 0.0, (i.e. there was likely no difference).

In the analysis, post-stratified weights were used to correct for bias due to nonresponse and underrepresented groups in the population.

Significant Differences Across Specific Responses WFU '18 White vs Under-Represented Minority Students(URM)

Assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 white respondents to any one particular survey item (n=138) along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 white respondents is 8.3%.

Similarly, assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 URM respondents to any one particular survey item (n=49), along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 URM respondents is 14.0%.

However, items identified here relied upon each item's actual number of responses and proportions when testing whether the differences in proportions between the groups, at the 95% confidence interval, included 0.0, (i.e. there was likely no difference).

In the analysis, post-stratified weights were used to correct for bias due to nonresponse and underrepresented groups in the population.

Significant Differences Across Specific Responses WFU '18 by Loan Amount

Assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 respondents-without-loan to any one particular survey item (n=38) along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 respondents without loan is 15.9%.

Similarly, assuming the minimum number of WFU 2018 respondents-with-loan to any one particular survey item (n=48), along with the portion which will yield the largest margin of error (i.e. 50%), the conservative margin of error for WFU 2018 respondents with loan is 14.1%.

However, items identified here relied upon each item's actual number of responses and proportions when testing whether the differences in proportions between the groups, at the 95% confidence interval, included 0.0, (i.e. there was likely no difference).

In the analysis, post-stratified weights were used to correct for bias due to nonresponse and underrepresented groups in the population.


During The Past Year, How Many Hours Do You Spend In Typical Week Studying/Doing Homework?




During The Past Year, How Many Hours Do You Spend In Typical Week In Clubs/Groups?


