Welcome back! I hope you have had a terrific summer full of projects, research, and renewal. The Dean's Office has been busy preparing for the new academic year, too. The Academic Advising staff has worked closely with the Registrar's Office to sign up our 1,311 incoming freshman for their fall courses. Last week, our office led a New Faculty Orientation for 39 visiting and permanent new faculty, and we inaugurated our first New Chairs Workshop for our 7 incoming department chairs with the help of President Hatch and Provost Kersh. Our office is also welcoming wonderful new members: Christa Colyer, Associate Dean for Academic Planning; Rebecca Alexander, Director of Academic Planning for Wake Downtown, who has a dual report to the Office of the Provost; and Michael Lamb, University Scholar in Residence, who has a dual report to the Office of Personal and Career Development.

We all have a big year ahead of us. We are implementing Wake Downtown; our first faculty will soon move to their new offices, our first courses are scheduled for this spring semester and a search is underway for the chair of the Engineering Department. At the same time we are witnessing mounting conflict and anxiety across the nation in the wake of deep concerns over policing, violence, and polarized politics, all with a presidential election just around the corner. As teachers and scholars who care deeply about our students and about our community we are in a unique position to analyze these troubled times and support our young people as they seek to understand this tumultuous world for themselves.

WAKE DOWNTOWN UPDATE

The Wake Downtown initiative, in which undergraduate courses will be held in renovated Reynolds Tobacco facilities in Wake Forest Innovation Quarter, is proceeding on schedule! Building 60 South will house programs approved last academic year in Medicinal Chemistry and Drug Discovery, Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, and Engineering. Walls are up, windows are in, and casework



is being installed. Spring 2017 courses taught there will include upper level chemistry and biology classes as well as several from history, education, politics, entrepreneurship, and the library. Engineering courses will begin in Fall 2017; the search is underway for the right chair of this new department to bring our vision of liberal arts engineering to reality. 

SUMMER SCHOOL IS GROWING

Opportunities for Summer 2017



A remarkable number of students (1,934) and faculty members (101) chose to spend their Summer in the Forest: that is, they engaged in teaching and learning during Summer Sessions I & II (in-person and on-line). Undergraduate students completed nearly 6,414 credit hours in lecture classes, independent research classes, and internships. Students who weren't able to stay with us on-campus were still able to engage in rigorous Wake Forest summer classes from their hometowns or other summer destinations by way of 9 online courses offered across 5 departments this summer. In mid-August we celebrated the graduation of 40 undergraduates thanks to the classes they were able to complete during Summer in the Forest 2016.

Seeking Summer School 2017 Professors

Even though the fall semester hasn't quite started, we are already looking ahead to Summer in the Forest 2017. Summer sessions provide students and faculty alike with unique opportunities to stay engaged in their academic mission while providing them with increased scheduling flexibility. Wake Forest students, joined by visiting college students and exceptional pre-college students, can capitalize on summer session offerings to advance their studies in their majors or to explore areas of new interest. We are especially interested in providing opportunities for our Wake Forest students to be able to pursue divisional courses in the summer. All faculty are invited and encouraged to attend this session to learn about the exciting new opportunities for our campus provided by a major grant from the Mellon Foundation. Opportunities include support for developing and implementing interdisciplinary team-taught courses focusing significantly on the engaged humanities, week-long interdisciplinary summer conferences, new ZSR staff to

support faculty working in digital humanities, summer course planning grants, and more! The session will provide important information about how you can apply to participate in these and other programs supported by the Mellon Foundation through summer 2019. Session panelists include Michele Gillespie (Dean of the College and Presidential Endowed Professor of Southern History), Tim Pyatt (Dean of the ZSR Library), Allison Perkins (Associate Provost for Reynolda House and Reynolda Gardens, and Director of the Reynolda House Museum of American Art), and Mary Foskett (Director of the Humanities Institute and Wake Forest Kahle Professor of Religious Studies).



Wednesday, October 5 - Application Deadline for NEH's **Humanities Connections** program, which offers competitive grants for up to \$100,000 for the development of a series of three or more linked courses focusing on significant humanities content. Projects must involve collaboration between faculty from separate departments or schools within an institution and incorporate meaningful student engagement activities. Linked courses may fulfill general education or core curriculum requirements but could also be designed primarily for students in a particular major or course of study. Special encouragement is given to projects that foster collaboration between humanities faculty and their counterparts in social and natural sciences and pre-service or professional programs. IN MEMORIAM

Marcellus Waddill, Professor Emeritus of Mathematics

Dr. Marcellus E. Waddill died on August 24, 2016 at the age of 86. He came to Wake Forest in 1962 after receiving his Ph.D. in mathematics from the University of Pittsburgh. He retired in 1997 as professor emeritus of mathematics. During his time at Wake Forest he was a devoted professor, colleague and friend. He served as chair of the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science for seven years in the 1980's. He also served as chair or member of many college and university committees including secretary-treasurer of Phi Beta Kappa. As an active member of the Wake Forest community, he received many honors and awards including: Jon Reinhart Award for distinguished teaching, Alumni Association's Faculty Prize for Community Service, Omicron Delta Kappa Award for outstanding contribution to student life and the Outstanding Chapter Advisor Sigma Chi Fraternity. In addition, the Marcellus Waddill Excellence in Teaching Award is awarded annually to two Wake Forest alumni who are exemplary classroom teachers in public or private K-12 schools.



THOMAS E. AND RUTH MULLEN STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Encourage Your Students to Apply: Deadline Saturday, October 15

The Committee on Scholarships and Student Aid invites sophomores, juniors, and seniors with outstanding records to compete to become Thomas E. and Ruth Mullen Scholars of the Upperclass Carswell Scholarships. These scholarships carry an annual stipend of \$1,500; once awarded they may be renewed for the remainder of the undergraduate education upon evidence of continuing academic and extracurricular achievement. The Mullen Scholar submits an Apologia at the end of the academic year. This document assesses the student's year and serves as a major basis for renewal. Like other Carswell Scholars, recipients of the Upperclass Carswell Scholarship are eligible to apply for Carswell summer grants before the senior year, and may be eligible for the Carswell Continuation Scholarship to the Wake Forest School of Law.

Applicants should submit to the Scholarship Committee a letter indicating the student's major area of interest, his or her extracurricular participation, and his or her hopes for future study or work while here and after graduation. Receipt of the letter gives the Committee the right to review the transcript and Dean's record of the student. Each applicant must also submit two faculty letters of recommendation to be sent by the faculty member to the Scholarship Committee. Click [here](#) for the application. 
Additionally, it serves as a wonderful chance for families to learn about other cultures and get to know a student from a different nation. This program can create rewarding relationships for years to come.



TECH TIP: STUDENTS WITH MACS ARE COMING - ARE YOU READY?

Tech Tip: Next week for the first time in 20 years you will have some students who do not have a standard



WFU-issued Windows laptop. You need to prepare for students with Macs. Does your course software run on both Windows and Mac? That is the best situation, though be aware that software may work slightly differently on the two platforms.

If you have software that only runs under Windows, that is OK. Have your students visit software.wfu.edu and install VM Fusion; this software allows students to run Windows on their Macs. If they need to run the Windows-only application, they can then go back to software.wfu.edu from within Windows on their Mac and install the appropriate **Windows** software.

Please alert your [instructional technologist](#) early if you anticipate using Windows-specific hardware in your courses or labs. We can make this work, but it may take more planning and coordination.

Please note that incoming students have been informed that they must have either a Mac or Windows laptop meeting certain requirements. Students on financial aid have a technology grant to cover the cost. You may still assume that every student has a computer capable of meeting their academic needs.
