as an online community in which WFU students can anonymously share their stories of stress, struggle, or trauma. The students who write the stories benefit from the disclosure of a difficult experience that they do not feel comfortable sharing otherwise, and the readers benefit from seeing that others may be experiencing similar situations. Priem's students also held an event entitled "Do'nut Keep It All Inside" (donuts and coffee were provided) to tell their peers about the website and recruit stories that could be posted.

TECH TIP: MISSING COURSE INFORMATION IN SAKAI



<u>David John, Interim Director of Academic and Instructional Technology</u> This tech tip comes from Instructional Technologist <u>Scott Claybrook</u>.

When a student says, "I can't find your <u>Sakai</u> course" at the beginning of the semester, consider this checklist:

- Did you remember to publish the site or is it still in Draft mode? Log in and check your section: Site Info > Manage Access. If it is in Draft mode, none of your students can see it. Publish it.
- 2. Is the student in the Sakai course participant list on the Site Info page?
- **YES**: Tell the student to log into Sakai and click the Sites Launcher in the upperright corner. Your course should be in his or her list of courses (the course has not been starred as a favorite and is not displayed in the black favorites bar that is visible on the main page). If you have the student on the course participant list and the course is not showing in the student's list of courses under the Sites Launcher, then he or she must go to the Service Desk.
- NO: Is the student on your <u>WIN</u> roster from the Registrar's office?

NO: Banner does not have the student registered in the course. The student needs to check with the <u>Registrar's Office</u>. If the student is trying to Add, he or she must complete all the necessary steps and give the Registrar's Office one business day to process the Add.

YES: If the student has been on the roster from the Registrar's Office for more than one business day, then most likely there is a problem with the Banner-Sakai synchronization for your course. Give it one more overnight for the Banner and

Sakai sync to synchronize. If the student is not on the Site Info participant list the next day, contact the Service Desk with the particulars.
