

Dean's Office Digest January 8, 2018



Welcome back and happy spring semester! We have several terrific college-wide events ahead: public scholar <u>Michael Eric Dyson</u>'s talk in celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. on **Monday, January 22, 2018**; *Hidden Figures* author <u>Margot Lee Shetterly</u>'s talk on **Monday, February 5, 2018**; <u>Senior</u>

Orations and Faculty Awards at Founder's Day Convocation on Tuesday, February 16, 2018; Dean's List Gala on Tuesday, February 23, 2018. Come celebrate with your students the values we uphold in our academic community. Meanwhile, the College Curriculum Review Committee's work has not slackened over the break. The recently administered faculty survey on the core curriculum netted a remarkable 82% participation rate. Thank you! The CCRC will meet Friday, January 12, 2018 to discuss this critical feedback and plan the next steps.

Colleagues frequently ask me why are we doing this review. What's wrong with our core curriculum? What's your agenda? I do not think our core curriculum is broken, nor is there an agenda. I am asking us as a college faculty to do nothing more than our collective duty, which is to periodically evaluate whether we believe our general education curriculum is meeting the needs of our students. It has been 19 years since we conducted a comprehensive review, and 11 since we reduced divisionals. Our current review, which builds on last year's examination of best practices at other schools and revealed that we stood virtually alone among peer and aspirational schools in not conducting an in-depth review for so long, is in direct response to the Committee on Academic Planning's 2006 recommendation that we examine our core curriculum more regularly.

This spring the CCRC, representing faculty at all stages of their career from every division of the college, is studying the work of the American Association of Colleges and Universities on defining the purpose of a liberal arts education; analyzing our own data from the faculty survey, core curriculum course selection, and other internal sources; and working to identify key student learning outcomes (such as the knowledge, skills, and ways of thinking that students should possess by the time they graduate from Wake Forest University). The CCRC will seek specific feedback and approval from the college faculty as we develop these student learning outcomes, and indeed, at every stage of the review process. Please refer to our CCRC webpage for a more extensive description of the CCRC work and to give us your feedback.

The transformative strength of our liberal arts education at WFU is in our shared commitment to the intentionality of our core curriculum. Periodic review, however daunting, ensures we continue to provide exceptional learning opportunities,

knowledge bases, and skill sets for all our students, truly preparing them to lead full, rich lives of meaning and purpose. In the end, this curriculum review is an exciting, empowering pursuit, one that embodies our highest aspirations for our students and for each other.



REMEMBERING DAVID CATRON



We are saddened by the loss of <u>David Catron</u>, Professor Emeritus of <u>Psychology</u>, who passed away on Monday, December 25, 2017. He joined WFU's faculty as an instructor in 1963 and taught at the university for 33 years. His retirement was recognized at commencement in 1994.
