

Dean's Office Digest November 13, 2017



I just gave a talk at my annual professional meeting about women and service. I told my audience that research has demonstrated again and again that women professors shoulder disproportionate service loads in academe. A study published last winter, "Faculty Service Loads and Gender: Are Women Taking Care of the Academic Family?", concluded after controlling

for rank, race, department, and campus, U.S. female professors performed, on average, 1.4 more service activities per year than their male counterparts. The difference was driven largely by internal service.

How can we redress this imbalance? How can we as a community, male and female, junior and senior, be smarter, fairer, more strategic about who does service, how much, and when? Rather than tell young women professors to avoid service like the plague, let's think about equitable distribution: how can we be more intentional about assigning service within departments, who we request it of across the college, and mentoring each other on assuming service duties?

We cannot simply turn our backs on internal service. Faculty governance will not be effective without it. Service is a powerful tool for building inclusive intellectual community, solving institutional problems, and generating exciting ideas. But in the end, we need to be far more mindful of who is doing the disproportionate service and more of us need to step up.

This dangerous activity involves upperclass students attempting to drink an entire 750 ml bottle of liquor (a "fifth" that is equivalent to 26 one-ounce shots) before kickoff of the last home football game. Last year saw a marked reduction in harms related to "Senior Fifth" as compared to the previous year. WFU is working hard to replicate the multi-pronged prevention, safety, and response efforts in order to continue this positive progress. TECH TIP: Narration in PowerPoint


This tech tip comes from Instructional Technologist <u>Jo Lowe</u>.

PowerPoint has been around for a while, but did you know you can make a quick narration in PowerPoint? And that you can also turn any PowerPoint presentation into a video? Here are some quick steps to insert narration into your slides, then convert it into a video.

- 1. Select the slide that you would like to narrate.
- 2. Click on the Insert tab.
- 3. Click on the drop-down list on the Audio button and choose Record Audio.



4. You will see the Record Sound dialog box shown here.




- 5. Click the Record button and start reading your narration. (If you need to pause during the narration, click Stop, then click Record to resume.)
- 6. Click the OK button when you have completed your narration for your selected slide.

To play voice narrations during a presentation, make sure that the Play Narrations check box is selected on the Slide Show tab.

How to make your PowerPoint into a video:

- 1. Open your PowerPoint presentation.
- 2. If you want narration for your presentation, record it and add timings to your slideshow.
- 3. Save your presentation.
- 4. Click on File> Export> Create a Video (Or, in PowerPoint 2016 only: On the Recording tab of the ribbon, click Export to Video.)
- 5. In the first drop-down box under the Create a Video heading, click on the video quality you need.
- 6. In the second drop down box, select if you want to use narration.
- 7. Then click Create Video.
