FALL IN THE FOREST

TECH TIP: EDITING YOUTUBE CLOSED CAPTIONS

Did you know that when you upload a video to YouTube, closed captions are added for you automatically after a few minutes? The captions are surprisingly accurate. You can also go in and edit the captions, adding punctuation and capitalization or making other changes. Watch this 7-minute video to see how easy it is to edit the captions.
