Agnes Callard, a philosopher at the <u>University of Chicago</u>, makes a trenchant distinction between ambition and aspiration in her latest book, <u>Aspiration: The Agency of Becoming</u>. Some of our students choose courses simply to check off the boxes en route to their degrees or to secure the easy "A." Other students take courses because they have an indefinable notion that to

do so will add value to their lives and will make a difference in who they hope to become. One of our roles as teachers, says Callard, is to convert ambition into aspiration in all our students. That may not be as hard as it seems given the wonderful examples of our faculty's own aspirations. Just this past Friday I learned that biologist Miles Silman is talking about sustainability with the Minister of Environment in Belize; historian Monique O'Connell is teaching Engineering students about the world of Leonardo da Vinci; Entrepreneurship director Dan Cohen and his team won second place in a national conference for emerging Entrepreneurship programs; and philosopher Ana Iltis and one of her undergraduate students are examining the ethics of drug trial composition. How exciting that this week's The Arts of Leading conference gives faculty at Wake Forest and beyond the opportunity to share how their aspirations for making meaning and finding value can profoundly shape how to lead one's life — the ultimate goal of a liberal arts education.
