t's hard to believe, but it has been 1,000 days since Wake
Forest University began a new chapter in its 185-year history with Wake Downtown. Joining in the revitalization of the heart of Winston-Salem, Wake Downtown opened its doors on January 9, 2017.

A unique blend of old and new, Wake Downtown is situated in a historic building that was once a R.J. Reynolds tobacco factory. This campus extension is an interdisciplinary hub housing three anchor programs: Engineering; Biochemistry and Molecular Biology; and Medicinal Chemistry. Wake Downtown also hosts courses from academic departments across the university that take advantage of the building's innovative teaching spaces and urban setting.


## In the first 1,000 days (spanning six academic year semesters and three summers), more than 3,400 students have taken 264 classes at Wake Downtown!

We're always open to classroom requests for semester-long courses or downtown Winston-Salem "field trips." This space also serves as a tremendous community resource hosting cultural, arts, and educational opportunities that bring together individuals from across the community and foster deeper relationships. In particular, the Wake Downtown auditorium has been used for university and community events. We look forward to expanding our connections with other community partners, including Winston-Salem State University, UNC School of the Arts, Salem College, and Forsyth Tech.

At Wake Downtown, we seek to embody Winston-Salem's motto "The City of Arts and Innovation" by celebrating Wake Forest's own talented artists. START.dt is a collaborative programming extension for the WFU student gallery (START). Student artists present work relating to a particular science or community outreach in spaces at Wake Downtown.

The Office of the Dean of the College thanks our many campus partners who have been instrumental in launching and supporting Wake Downtown — and we look forward to many more years of collaboration and growth!



Wednesday, Dec. 4, at 5 p.m., ZSR Auditorium





make a huge difference in both the quality of images and how fast they load on web pages. The short story: use JPG for photographic images and use PNG for logos, line art, or any image that is made up mostly of large areas of precisely uniform color.



Every Wednesday in January, at 5:30 p.m., Forsyth Co. Central Library



## ADVISING SENIORS INTENDING TO GRADUATE IN MAY

Please review DegreeWorks for each senior you advise. The requirement block and individual course requirements should have green check marks beside them or a squiggly line (if they are enrolled in but have not completed the course requirement). If any students have unmet requirements (empty red check boxes), please reach out to them immediately because their May graduation could be in jeopardy.

## POST-REGISTRATION ADVISING ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Open Course Report is an easy-to-read listing of Spring 2020 courses with open seats, updated weekly from the end of registration through the last day to add. Tell your advisees who are looking for course openings that they should view the Open Course Report on the Office of Academic Advising website.

#### **FINAL EXAM POLICIES**

There should be no departure from the final exam policy unless prior arrangement has been made through the Committee on Academic Affairs. If you have any questions about this policy, please consult your chair or Associate Dean of Academic Advising Ashley Hairston.

The policy states: Students should have no more than two final exams in a 24-hour period. If they do, they should be permitted to reschedule one.

Alternative exam times can be scheduled in addition to the regularly scheduled exams, provided the additional times fall within the allotted time period for exams. Evenings could be used for scheduling.

No exams should be given in lieu of final exams before the beginning of the regularly scheduled exam period.

Tests counting one-fourth or more of a student's grade are not to be given during the last week of classes. If such tests are deemed necessary at the end of the semester, they should be given during the scheduled final exam period.
