#### From the Dean

Not all that long ago, many of us expected the pandemic would be over by 2021. Alas, that will not be the case. The good news is that the course delivery system we built across four modalities this past summer is holding up well four weeks into our fall semester. This is important because we need to begin Spring Course Planning, with the goal of registering all our students by Thanksgiving. We are soliciting feedback about fall teaching from department chairs and faculty focus groups this week in an effort to better define

our modalities going forward. We have also solicited feedback from students about their learning so far. As you start thinking about your spring courses, it may be helpful to hear some general impressions students have shared — some very positive and some a little less so — about their experiences learning in the different modalities:

- Professors are working really hard and are accessible and accommodating
- Recorded lectures and other online tools are helpful
- Zoom breakout sessions work well for student engagement
- Canvas works best when the information is well organized and clearly communicated
- Blended courses can be confusing and hard to keep track of when the schedule changes often
- Synchronous courses provide a stronger sense of normalcy but can be tiring
- Asynchronous courses have greater flexibility but can be isolating

Like all of you, the students miss their face to face courses. Those students in face to face courses this semester report they are going really well and hope for more face to face courses this spring. Above all, our students expressed sincere appreciation for the ways their faculty care for their learning and wellbeing.

## REYNOLDS AND JUNIOR RESEARCH LEAVES FOR AY21-22

Applications for AY21-22 Reynolds and Junior Research leaves are due **Monday**, **Nov. 2**. Applications should be submitted by department chairs to **Anna Henley** in the Dean's Office.

The time has come, again, to begin planning for future faculty hires and course coverage. Faculty position requests for permanent and temporary faculty will be accepted by the Associate Dean of Academic Planning between Oct. 1 and Nov. 2. Temporary position requests accepted during this window will be for hire for the Spring 2021 semester and the 2021-2022 academic year. Permanent position requests should be intended for search during the 2021-2022 year and hire for the 2022-2023 academic year. Who is eligible: Wake Forest College Junior Faculty Members who hold the rank of Assistant Professor or who were promoted from Assistant to Associate Professor in the last academic year are eligible for this prestigious award.

The primary criterion for selection is excellence in teaching. Nominations for the Reid-Doyle Teaching Award are submitted by chairs, program directors, or senior faculty (with chair approval) from within the nominee's department or program.

The Reid-Doyle Prize for Excellence in Teaching, along with a monetary award, will be presented at a ceremony at the end of the spring semester. Plan now to nominate a deserving faculty member from your department.

#### SENIOR ORATIONS

The Senior Orations submission deadline is **Sunday**, **Nov. 8**.

Who is eligible: Students who are eligible for graduation in May 2021 or have graduated in August or December 2020.

Faculty can nominate students to prepare and present orations for the 2021 Senior Colloquium competition, which will take place on Wednesday, Feb. 3. Nominated students will have demonstrated substance, depth, clarity, and style in their oral presentations.

Wake Forest has been honoring senior orators since 1869. This remarkable tradition elevates the importance of thoughtful public discourse within the university community and beyond. How to nominate: Please send the full name of your nominee/s (we need no other reference information) and submit to <u>Sarah Frederick</u> in the Office of the Dean of the College by Nov. 8. The Office of the Dean of the College will then contact nominated students and invite them to submit manuscripts.

#### COVID-19 DASHBOARD UPDATE

#### **INFLUENZA VACCINES**

Wake Forest University will be offering free flu shots to all faculty, staff, and retirees from Sept. 21 to Oct. 19. Spouses and dependent children (8 years and older) who are enrolled in the University's BlueCross BlueShield medical plan are also eligible.

In addition to a variety of clinics on campus for current employees, WFU is offering a drive-through flu shot location at LJVM Coliseum to accommodate off-site colleagues, retirees, and family members.

#### WELLBEING CENTER OPEN FOR FACULTY, STAFF, & RETIREES

#### START GALLERY

#### REYNOLDA HOUSE POLICIES FOR FIELD TRIPS, STUDENT RESEARCH PROJECTS

#### How do I schedule a socially-distanced field trip to Reynolda?

To visit the museum as a group: We ask faculty to make their own reservations online. You will be able to do so within capacity limits; please include yourself in the total number. You may move through the house in groups of 4 or less. So, a class of 8 students and 1 faculty will move through the house in a minimum of 3 separate groups. Free, available Tuesday-Saturday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sundays from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

To meet outdoors on the Grounds or in the Gardens: Reservations aren't required, but it's always a good idea to give a heads up when you plan to bring a group. Email <a href="Mamber Albert">Amber Albert</a> with the date, group size, and preferred location. Be mindful of the weather forecast and other recreational guests. WFU safety protocols still apply. Free, available dawn to dusk.

For individual students to visit the museum: Students can make their own reservations for self-guided tours. They will still be asked to follow WFU & Reynolda safety protocols but will enjoy increased flexibility in terms of how they navigate the smaller historic spaces. Free, available Tuesday to Saturday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sundays from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Share <u>Reynolda's safety guidelines</u> with your students in advance, no matter which of the above options you choose.



### What about independent student research projects?

In the spirit of continued academic exploration, Reynolda welcomes individual research projects. We will first direct you and your students to our online exhibitions and collections, which can be searched or browsed 24/7.



## TECH TIP

#### POWERPOINT SLIDES AS A VIRTUAL BACKGROUND

Zoom now allows us to choose a special virtual background when sharing our screen. This new feature allows the instructor more control over their video and what the students are seeing. It also simplifies the sharing process for PowerPoint by directly sharing slides as a presentation rather than the older options of a whole application or even a whole screen.

Advantages of using this feature:

- Instructor video is present on the screen share.
- Video can be re-positioned rapidly and resized by the presenter.

## REPRESENTATION MATTERS: ART, SPACE, AND RACIAL RESTITUTION


