University Divinity School is committed to
educating persons from a variety of Christian
traditions for ministry in those traditions. The
Baptist Studies Program is designed to educate
men and women for leadership and ministry
in Baptist congregations and related institutions. The program seeks to aid students in
understanding Baptist identity within an
ecumenical context through courses in Baptist
history, theology, polity and ministry. In addition to curricular offerings, the Program provides opportunities for supervised internships
in Baptist congregations and other settings.

Curriculum

Recognizing the importance of understanding the Baptist traditions for the practice of ministry, the Divinity School offers the following courses:

- A History of Baptists
- Religions in America
- Church and State in America
- Christianity and Public Policy
- British Dissent 1550-1750
- Selected Topics in Baptist Studies
- Independent Studies
- Senior Projects in Baptist Studies

A variety of core courses offers students an opportunity to focus research in areas of Baptist history, ethics, and theology.

INTERNSHIPS IN BAPTIST CONTEXTS

As part of the Divinity School's emphasis on vocational development, students are required to complete a year of supervised ministry in their second year. Baptist students have the opportunity to work and learn in Baptist congregations, institutional settings such as campus ministry and hospital chaplaincy, and through the arts. Additional internships are available during the third year of study.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Through the generous support of individuals and churches, the Divinity School provides a significant number of scholarships designated for Baptist students. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of merit and need. The Divinity School also works closely with churches and denominational bodies that support Baptist students with supplemental financial resources.
