Courses Outside of Divinity

Why would I take courses outside of the Divinity School?

- WATED • Courses in the University will help you take an interdisciplinary approach to your Divinity education.
- Interdisciplinary work
 - Promotes a more complex understanding of the world and its problems and opens up the imagination to a wider, interconnected web of responses to those problems
 - Cultivates skill-building in areas of expertise outside of theological education that are relevant for many ministry contexts
 - Fosters creativity and innovation as you integrate various academic disciplines with your graduate theological education

What courses should I take?

- What courses might help prepare you for your vocational path? How can you gain practical skills for your future? For example, could communications courses help you with public speaking? Would professional studies courses prepare you for a career in nonprofit leadership? Could music courses benefit your church ministry?
- Think of your passions and interests that transcend the expertise of theological education. How do these intersect with what you are learning in our divinity curriculum? What kind of cross-disciplinary work could you do to foster these passions and interests outside of divinity? For example, do you want to study literature and theology? Do you want to learn about sustainability so you can apply it to your church ministry? Would courses in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies help you deepen your intersectional analysis of oppressions in the world? Courses outside Divinity can help you integrate your interests and passions with your Divinity coursework and your future work in ministry.
- Do you need to fulfill your language requirement? Or, are you just interested in reading those famous theologians in their native German? Could you learn Spanish to help in your future nonprofit ministry?

*If you see a 300-level course that interests you, you can email the instructor of the course and ask if you can take it for graduate credit. You would have to agree upon graduate-level work beyond the 300-level coursework being offered. Their department would have to set up a graduate-level section for you. Alternatively, you can ask the instructor if you can register for the course as an auditor and then set up an independent study with a Divinity professor who can be your conversation partner on the subject matter and who can assign coursework for you to complete.

Ethical and Inclusive Leadership Certificate

3 Courses, 9 credits Online, Asynchronous

The Ethical and Inclusive Leadership Certificate, offered in collaboration with Wake Forest University's School of Divinity, prepares you to lead an organization more effectively and to be an inclusive leader, and teaches you how to use ethics-oriented decision making.

EIL 710

Moral and Ethical Dimensions of Inclusive Leaders

Investigate current theories and knowledge about the moral and ethical dimensions of inclusive leadership in contemporary organizational contexts. In this course, learners will apply ethical competencies, empathic listening, and leadership strategies for inclusive vision-casting.

EIL 712

Decision Making and Conflict Management

Develop a deeper understanding of ethical decision-making and effective conflict management agains a backdrop of major social, economic, and cultural transitions. In this course, learners will gain the knowledge and skills for navigating complex organizational landscapes.

EIL 714

Shaping an Ethical and Inclusive Organization

Examine theories and practices that shape inclusive organizational culture while exploring the diversity, equity, and inclusion challenges. In this course, learners will create operational plans that employ practice strategies for implementing healthy changes in organizations.

The three courses may be taken in any order and will be offered on a regular rotation throughout the year as long as interest in the program remains.

The rotation schedule (subject to change) is as follows: Spring '24: 712 and 714, Summer '24: 710 and 712; Fall '24: 714 and 710, Spring '25: 712 and 714
