25 YEARS OF SUPPORTING TEACHERS: REFLECTIONS ON THE PAST AND VISIONS FOR THE FUTURE





Dr. Brown and Dr. Wolf are part of the <u>College Autism Spectrum</u>, an independent organization of professionals whose work and research focus on the needs of college students with autism.

Summer Course Design Institute

This summer, the CAT will host an in-person 4-day, intensive course design program for faculty interested in designing or redesigning a course. The institute will run a full 4 days (with working time and lunch provided) and require the completion of homework between each session. You will have the opportunity to work together with colleagues from across the University.

The institute is designed to get you to a final (or near final) syllabus by the end of the week. Participants who successfully complete all Institute requirements will receive a \$1,500 stipend.

We ask that you apply only if you are able to commit to all four (4) days in-person. **The first 12 applicants** to submit complete proposals will be accepted so we encourage you to apply as soon as you are able.

Summary writing is difficult: it requires adept reading comprehension, synthesis, organization, and paraphrase. Teaching summary writing can be just as daunting: How do you explain what's "important" from a piece of writing—or better yet, how can you help student writers identify key information for their summaries (without cherry picking)? How do you build their confidence in using metacommentary and citation to avoid plagiarism? And how can we make summarizing a meaningful and—dare I say—fun exercise for student writers?


