## Assessing Mastery of Student Learning: Strategies for Departments and Programs of Study

Topics will include program level student learning outcomes, scaffolded learning experiences, methods for direct and indirect measures of student learning, and sampling strategies. Participants will be encouraged to share ideas, experiences, and examples of their work.
