Innovative Teaching Award

Applications for the TLC's Innovative Teaching Award **are due TODAY (Monday, February 4th), no later than 5:00 p.m.** This award recognizes the effort put forth by faculty who have redesigned their courses or introduced new courses with innovative, research-based approaches to the practice of teaching, using new methods and/or technologies, with an intentional emphasis on how these innovations improved or facilitated student learning. In Spring 2019, the TLC will recognize up to five faculty members with this award. The Spring 2019 award is intended for courses taught in Fall 2017, Spring 2018, Summer 2018, or Fall 2018. All faculty teaching on the Reynolda and Wake Downtown Campuses are invited to apply.

Summer Course (Re)Design Grants

Applications for our Summer Course (Re)Design program **are due on Friday, February 15th, no later than 5:00 p.m.** The grants awarded under this program fund work undertaken in the summer, including 4-6 required cohort meetings. Faculty will receive stipends of either \$3,500 (9-month) or \$1,500 (12-month), and up to \$500 can be requested for additional expenses. All faculty teaching on the Reynolda and Wake Downtown Campuses are invited to apply.

Speed Up with Specifications Grading

Join us to discuss how specifications grading (Nilson, 2014) might work in your class. All assignments are evaluated on a high-standards pass/fail basis, and students' final course grade is determined by the number of assignments or units successfully completed. This system puts the emphasis on achievement and constructive feedback rather than on numbers or letters. Professor Gellar-Goad will present the basics of the system, some tips for making good assignment checklists, and the advantages and disadvantages of working with specs grading.

Tuesday, February 26, 9:00AM-12:00PM

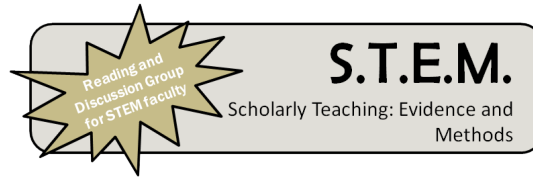
