#### Becoming a "Model Teacher"

Being an excellent university teacher means (re)considering your teaching at a number of different levels: face-to-face interaction with students, your training/education, course design, implementation of learning goals, and assessments. In their book, An Evidence Based Guide to College and University Teaching, Richmond, Boysen & Gurung (2016) describe a model they developed to encompass the dimensions of excellent teaching. In this workshop, we will learn about the teaching competencies outlined in their model, practice self-reflection on how to improve our model teaching, and get specific tips and ideas to use in

the classroom. Model teaching criteria are an excellent way to gain formative information about our own teaching, as well as serve as a guide for tenure and promotion.

# First-Year Course Advising Faculty Learning Community

To celebrate and support course-advising, the Office of Academic Advising is partnering with the Teaching and Learning Collaborative to facilitate a six-month FLC on the rewards and challenges of course-advising with first-year students. Faculty who participate in this FLC will:

- Commit to advising students in a course they are teaching in Fall 2019. Courses can be composed of all first-year students (such as FYS, WRI, or FYE) or can be a more diverse class that has enough first-year students to constitute an advising group
- Attend a day-long retreat on May 23, 2019
- Attend four meetings throughout the fall semester (two elective workshops and two lunches with the FLC).

Participants who complete all components of the FLC will receive a stipend of \$500 at the conclusion of Fall 2019.
