#### • Writing a Teaching Philosophy 1: Writing Your Philosophy, 12:00-1:15

If you intend to apply for academic positions, it is likely that you will be asked to submit your philosophy of teaching statement as part of your application. During this session, we'll discuss format and style expectations and you will begin articulating your ideas and values around teaching. This will assist you in crafting a teaching philosophy that effectively communicates who you are as a teacher.

# • Active Learning, 1:30-2:45

All of the recent research into learning and how learning occurs, points to the effectiveness and necessity of actively engaging students in the classroom. It is not enough for instructors to 'show and tell' information, answers, processes, etc.; students must engage with the material and come up with their own interpretations, answers, steps and understandings. In this workshop we'll learn some basic techniques to promote active learning in the classroom. Register here
