Meeting Minutes

General Business

- Dwayne Godwin welcomed the Graduate Faculty.
- Dwayne Godwin chaired the meeting.

1. Minutes of the November 28, 2017 Meeting (attached)

A motion was made to accept the minutes, seconded and unanimously approved.

2. Report on activities of the Faculty Senate (Larry Daniel)

Larry provided a summary of the Faculty Senate's activities. He mentioned that his co-chair Anna will also provide report to be attached to the minutes. A major topic dealt by the Faculty Senate circled around the idea that donors can give gifts/donations and thereby affect or influence teaching or educational objectives. For example philanthropic donations could potentially affect educational goals, which was considered a major concern to the Faculty. The Faculty Senate met with the Provost several times over the year and met with the committee on Conflict of Interest (COI). As a result, they have develop a memo on the implementation of COI management and resolution for such cases to protect our educational and teaching objectives. The Faculty Senate believes that this memo and approach for better COI management has resolved the issue.

Another recommendation through the Faculty Senate is to have a 12 member committee to work with all new Centers and review all centers/grants to make sure that they are adhering to COI and make sure that they are not impacting education/training goals.

This committee is similar to the Industry relations group that focuses on COI on the biomedical campus.

3. Report on activities of the Graduate Council (Ellie Rahbar)

Ellie Rahbar provided a summary of the activities of the Graduate Council. Over the spring semester, the Curriculum Committee reviewed and approved 56 curriculum requests. The Credentials Committee approved 30 faculty members. The Policy Committee has reviewed and recommended changes to the Code of Conduct language for graduate students, but they have not been formally approved as of yet. The Graduate Council also created a new Long-

Range Planning Committee led by Ellen Kirkman, Abdou Lachgar and Allyn Howlett. The goal of this committee is to evaluate graduate programs and develop ideas on how to improve programs for long-term success.

4. Course Additions, Deletions, Changes

All course additions, deletions and changes were reviewed. A motioned was made, seconded and approved unanimously.

Other Business

1. Program Proposals/Changes

a. Proposal for a Regenerative Medicine Concentration (Joan Schanck, Graca Almeida-Porada)

Joan Schanck presented the background and impetus for a Regenerative Medicine (RM) Concentration. The objective is to make students more competitive for RM careers outside

of academia and to provide more visibility to the RM program and curriculum. Must receive a B (3.0) or higher in the RM courses. The concentration would be open and available to all graduate level students (both Reynolda and Biomedical campuses).

Curriculum information can be found in the written proposal.

A motion was made to approve the Regenerative Medicine concentration. The motion was seconded, and unanimously approved.

b. Proposal for a Graduate Concentration in Antimicrobial Stewardship and Infection Prevention (Werner Bischoff)

A faculty proxy presented the background and motivation for an Antimicrobial Stewardship and Infection Prevention concentration in Dr. Bischoff's absence. There is a growing need to provide greater training and education on antimicrobial stewardship and infection prevention, particularly in out-patient settings. Requirements include 11 credits for the concentration (7 extra hours, 4 credits are already a part of the MS in CPTS). This concentration is designed to be complementary to the established CPTS program; however it is not not restricted to CPTS program only, but any MS program. This is one of the first programs to incorporate public health, epidemiology with global disease burden. Certificate will be provided upon completion signed by the Director of the program.

A motion was made to approve the Antimicrobial Stewardship and Infection Prevention concentration. The motion was seconded, and unanimously approved.

c. Proposal for a Graduate Concentration in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (Wanda Balzano)

Wanda Balzano, Chair of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGS), presented the objective and motivation for a concentration in WGS at the graduate level. There has been a growing interest to study gender and sexuality from a variety disciplinary perspectives in conjunction with their study towards a master's degree. For example, graduate students in English, Communication, Psychology, Religious studies, Education, have demonstrated strong interests. WGS does not have an independent graduate degree, so this concentration will be of great benefit to other complimentary programs. The concentration will provide the student with greater recognition of their unique skill sets developed during their master's program. The requirements of the WGS concentration include 12 credits and a public talk. A certificate will be provided upon completion signed by the Director of the program.

A motion was made to approve the Women's, Gender and Sexuality Studies concentration. The motion was seconded, and unanimously approved.

2. Policy Committee Updates Announcements

Tim Howard provided a brief update about the Code of Conduct policy changes. The Code of Conduct language for graduate students is not as in-depth as the medical school or undergraduate student populations. The policy committee is revising the handbook

language to take out some redundancies and to make sure the language is accurate, while protecting student rights (also will not infringe on first amendment rights). If there is a violation of code of conduct, graduate students will have to go through the Honors Code/Committee reviewing process but this will be counted as a code of conduct violation.
