

Graduate School of Arts & Sciences Student AI Policy

This guidance is provided for courses starting Spring semester 2025. The Graduate School is providing this guidance with the understanding that AI is rapidly developing, thus new guidance may be issued with these developments at any time.

1. Faculty may consider incorporating generative AI (GAI) into their courses as a means of educating students on approaches for responsible use of AI as appropriate for professionals in different disciplines, or in the context of specific program utilization of AI essential to the expansion of human knowledge.
 - a. Students are responsible for requesting clarification when they are uncertain about the appropriateness of a given use of GAI (and when they have questions about maintaining academic integrity more broadly) in a particular context.
 - b. Instructors are responsible for communicating their policies and guidelines to students. This needs to include directions regarding the authorized use of GAI, including method(s) for disclosing such use (i.e. when and how GAI tools can be used, along with when and how such use should be acknowledged). Instructors may decide that no AI tools are permitted at all.
 - c. As such, unauthorized use of generative AI platforms will be considered academic misconduct. This is regardless of the setting such as the classroom, laboratory, studio, internship, externship, independent research setting, or any other space identified as serving educational goals.
