2021 CHARACTER AND THE PROFESSIONS CONFERENCE

SUMMARY REPORT



CONFERENCE OVERVIEW


The 2021 Character and the Professions Conference explored the role of character across six professional contexts: business, engineering and technology, law, medicine, public life, and religious leadership. The conference hosted 35 keynote speakers and panelists across fifteen sessions centered around seven key themes: Diversity, Business, Engineering and Technology, Law, Medicine, Public Life, and Religious Leadership. The conference also included live interpreting services in Chinese and Spanish.



ATTENDEES

At least 1,337 people attended the conference,* including 304 attendants of the Face to Face event. Conference registrants represented 47 countries and territories and at least 24** were represented at the conference. U.S. registrants came from 43 states. and at least 38 states were represented. The countries or regions most represented among attendees who registered included the United States of America (786, 76.1 %), followed by the United Kingdom (22, 2.1%), and Canada (4, 0.4%). The U.S. states that had the most attendees included: North Carolina (351), Virginia (30), and Pennsylvania (21).

PROFESSIONAL AFFILIATION

Attendees represented a wide variety of professional fields, with most attendees affiliated with Higher Education (284, 27.49%); "Other" (223, 20.76%); Business (209, 21.59%); and Law (117, 11.33%). 206 attendees that registered (19.94%) identified with multiple professional fields listed.

^{*}Some unregistered attendees were able to unexpectedly access the session Zoom links or used a different Zoom account to access the event. This number represents a conservative estimate of all conference attendees. Subsequent attendee analysis is based on the confirmed 1,033 attendees, not including the Face to Face participants.

^{**}The location of the Face to Face event attendees could not be confirmed.



WAKE FOREST AFFILIATION

The majority of registrants (1,853, 79.39%) and 648 (60.34%) attendees affiliated themselves with Wake Forest University in some way, demonstrating the support for the conference across campus. The largest group of WFU-affiliated registrants were alumni or parents of a current or former students (237, 22.94%), followed by current WFU students (190, 18.39%) and WFU faculty/staff members (167, 16.17%).


SESSION ATTENDANCE

2,334 people registered for the conference, with an average registration of 700 registrants for both the keynote and panel discussion for each session (excluding the Face to Face session).

The following three sessions had the most attendees:

- Public Life (609)
- Diversity (296)
- Engineering (295)
