

Performance, exhibition, Homecoming with Wake the Arts

Dear Friends of Wake the Arts,

This October is packed with creative energy here at Wake Forest. I'm especially thrilled to invite you to join me and my colleague Molly Kaderka for the opening reception of our two-person exhibition at the Hanes Gallery, titled **The Darkness**, on Thursday, October 16th, from 5pm to 8pm, which will include a performance piece I call *The Induction Ceremony* at 6pm. Even if you can't join us then, I hope you'll stop by the gallery to check it out (the exhibition is on view through December 12th). I'm so excited to share this work with the entire Wake community.

My own work in the exhibition is focused on capturing this particular moment we are all living through. It consists of drawings of the major figures dominating the

headlines these days, as well as artists, writers, and thinkers we have lost in the last couple of years. Given the onslaught of daily news — much of it profoundly negative — it can be difficult to stay informed and engaged, but I think it is our duty. Accompanying my paintings is a series of ceramic works, *The Healing Devices*, and two large sculptures, *Black Rock Negative Energy Absorbers*. These works are intended to serve as a counterpoint to the harsh realities of the day, offering a solution rooted in the power of faith, the power of art, and the power of love.

My performance on October 16th, *The Induction Ceremony*, will explore these themes. As my character, *The Healer*, I will activate my Black Rock Negative Energy Absorber sculptures. This performance combines elements of jazz improvisation, experimental/noise music, and performance art to create a type of séance in which the performers and viewers are lifted out of the current political moment and brought to a place of cathartic release. This will include Rhys Shepherd and me (as *The Healer*) on midi controller, theremin, and various noise-making objects, Elia Einhorn on keys and harmonium, Marcus Braithwaite on drums, and Mark Dixon on bass.

The Art Department has many more exciting events in the coming weeks, including a Community Night on October 21, a talk by Vermont Cartoonist Laureate Tillie Walden titled "Comics and Queerness in Vermont and Beyond" on October 22, a lecture by Art History alum Andy Rosenwald titled "Life after Art History: Turning Passion into Practice" on October 23rd, and the opening of Let it Show! at stArt Gallery on November 10th.

I'm also looking forward to "Inter Alia: North Carolina Forests," a collaborative commission between composer David Kirkland Garner, poet Ishion Hutchinson and premiered by the WFU Symphony Orchestra with the UNCSA Symphony Orchestra. In the coming weeks, we'll be honored with the presence of jazz legends as the Secrest Artists Series brings Christian McBride on bass and Brad Mehldau on piano—and on November 9 we'll hear words of wisdom from saxophone legend Branford Marsalis as he receives the 2025 Maya Angelou

Artist-in-Residence Award. I hope to see you at many - if not all - of these art focused events (and many more events, such as the opening of **Baskerville: A**Sherlock Holmes Mystery that you can read about below!)!

Inter Alia: North Carolina Forests

Artist Residency and Concert: October 20-25, 2025

Performance: Friday, October 24: Brendle Recital Hall, 7:30pm

The UNCSA Symphony Orchestra and the Wake Forest University Symphony Orchestra perform together in a free side-by-side concert at Brendle Recital Hall on the campus of Wake Forest University.

Conducted by J. Aaron Hardwick, the program features Jean Sibelius's radiant *Symphony No. 3 in C Major* and the world premiere of "*Inter Alia*," a new work for soprano and orchestra by composer David Kirkland Garner. Based on a poem of the same name by Ishion Hutchinson — a 2023 T.S. Eliot Prize finalist — the piece explores tree species native to Western North Carolina, including on the campus of Wake "Forest." Soprano Jodi Burns from the UNCSA School of Music faculty joins the orchestras in this unique collaboration, showcasing students from both institutions in a powerful celebration of nature, music and creative partnership.



Who's Making Things Happen

Acting with Power with Melissa Jones Briggs ('04)

Can acting skills be valuable in the boardroom? How can we use the tools of theater and improvisation to enhance our leadership skills, foster authenticity, and navigate power dynamics? Melissa Jones Briggs is a Lecturer in Organizational Behavior at Stanford University's Graduate School of Business and also



serves as an Associate Fellow at the Oxford Character Project at the University of Oxford. She specializes in performance as a tool for social and organizational change. In this conversation, we explore the intersection of theater and leadership, talking about the importance of empathy, presence, and the role of personal power. The discussion also touches on the challenges of covering and uncovering identity in professional settings, the responsibility of the arts in social change, and the significance of relationships in defining success.

URECA Day showcases student research

Studio art major Blair Newsome wanted to find sustainable ways to reconcile the use of oil paint in art classes with ecological responsibility. She combined pigment powders with seed oils, plant-based solvents, and historical binders such as egg tempera as part of her research project.



"These materials, though slower to prepare, proved cost-effective, reusable, and environmentally low-impact," said Newsome, who is earning a minor in environmental studies. "Packaging analysis further revealed that sustainable suppliers extend ecological values to distribution, in contrast with wasteful massmarket retailers."
