## **DISTINGUISHED GUEST**



A national spokesperson for graduate education in America, Debra Stewart became the fifth president of the Council of Graduate Schools in July, 2000. Prior to coming to the Council, Stewart was Vice Chancellor and Dean of the Graduate School at North Carolina State University. She also served as Interim Chancellor at UNC-Greensboro (1997) and as graduate dean and then vice provost (1988-1998) at N.C. State. The Council of Graduate Schools is the leading organization dedicated to the improvement and advancement of graduate education. Its 453 members award over 95% of all U.S. doctorates and approximately 70 percent of all U.S. master's degrees. Among its 21 international members, the Council includes 10 major Canadian universities.

Stewart's service to graduate education includes chair of the Graduate Record Examination Board, chair of the

Council on Research Policy and Graduate Education, chair of the Board of Directors of Oak Ridge Associated Universities, and chair of the Board of Directors of Council of Graduate Schools. She also served as vice chair of the ETS Board of Trustees, as Trustee of the Triangle Center for Advanced Studies, as a member of the American Council on Education Board and several National Research Council Committees. She currently serves on the National Research Council Board of Higher Education and the Workforce, the National Research Council Committee on Educational Paradigms for Homeland Security, and advisory boards for the Carnegie Initiative on the Doctorate, the Responsive Ph.D. Project, and the Task Force on Immigration and America's Future.

During her 12 years in leadership positions in North Carolina, Stewart worked to mobilize stakeholders inside and outside the university to advance university programs. She spearheaded a strategic plan for graduate education at N.C. State that created a framework for interdisciplinary curriculum, significantly enhanced financial support for graduate assistants, and solved a long term problem with tuition remission. These changes transformed the competitive position of the university for the top students internationally. She lectures nationally and internationally on graduate education issues and challenges.

Stewart received her Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, her master's degree in government from the University of Maryland, and her B.A. from Marquette University where she majored in philosophy. She is the author or coauthor of numerous scholarly articles on administrative theory and public policy. Her disciplinary research focuses on ethics and managerial decision making. With sustained support from the National Science Foundation, she has conducted research on political attitudes and moral reasoning among public officials in Poland and Russia.

## **GRADUATE SCHOOL OF ARTS AND SCIENCES**

The first announcement of a program of study leading to an earned graduate degree at Wake Forest University was made in 1866. Between 1871, when the first degrees earned under the plan were awarded to John Bruce Brewer (grandson of Samuel Wait) and Franklin Hobgood, and 1951, 383 master of arts and master of science degrees were granted. In 1949 the School of Arts and Sciences discontinued admitting applicants for the master of arts degree because the rapid increase in the size of the undergraduate student body following World War II had overloaded the faculty. The School of Medicine did not interrupt its graduate program. The first master of science degree was regularly offered thereafter by the departments of anatomy, biochemistry, microbiology, pharmacology, and physiology.

During the fifteen years the College and the School of Medicine were located in different towns, the studies of graduate education continued on both campuses. The self-study report adopted by the faculty of the School of Arts and Sciences immediately prior to its move to Winston-Salem

recommended that graduate study leading to the master's degree be resumed as soon as practicable. In 1958 the administration of the School of Medicine, in view of an increasing demand for graduate instruction in basic medical and clinical sciences, appointed a Committee on Graduate Studies for the purpose of reorganizing the graduate program.

As a result of these two parallel studies and in recognition of the need for an institution-wide approach to graduate education, the trustees, on January 13, 1961 established the Division of Graduate Studies and authorized it to grant the master of arts degree in the School of Arts and Sciences and the master of science and doctor of philosophy degrees in the School of Medicine. The first Ph.D. degree was awarded in 1964. On June 12, 1967, when Wake Forest College became Wake Forest University, the name of the Division of Graduate Studies was changed to the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences. The first Ph.D. program on the Reynolda Campus was begun in 1970.

The Graduate School encompasses advanced work in the arts and sciences and biomedical sciences on both the Reynolda and Bowman Gray campuses of the University.

## **STATEMENT OF PURPOSE**

The Graduate School, operating within the framework of these principles [of Wake Forest University] seeks to provide a community of faculty and advanced students dedicated to teaching, research, and productive scholarship. Through graduate programs in the arts and sciences and the basic medical sciences, an effort is made to expand the frontiers of knowledge and to keep abreast of man's understanding of the rapidly changing human environment. As a significant feature of the educational process, students are encouraged to develop initiative, resourcefulness, and responsibility required of those who become independent intellectual leaders in their chosen fields of endeavor.
